Dear Mr. Bird,

I am interested in taking students on an international trip to New York City for an arts and history tour. The tour would be during spring break of 2026. As the drama teacher and director of our school's dinner theatre program, I have been honoured to see what arts and creativity has accomplished for our students. We have extremely creative and talented students within our school, and I am continually exploring ways for the students to explore their theatrical education both inside and outside of school. Examples of such activities are the Artstrek Theatre Camp that I have assisted students in attending the last few summers as well as field trips to the Citadel Theatre for performances of *A Christmas Carol* and *Sound of Music*.

Many of our students who are interested in the performing arts do not have the same opportunities to explore these interests due to our physical location. As someone who grew up in Edmonton, I had the privilege to attend many performances, workshops, camps, and experiences throughout my youth due to being in a large city with opportunities continually present throughout the year. Our students in Mayerthorpe do not have these privileges. I am constantly talking to students about my experiences and listening to their interest and hopes of experiencing more theatrical experiences.

The tour leans itself towards areas of curricular connections in both arts and history. The students will get to receive tours of many infamous buildings that shaped the artistic community both in and out of New York City. Students will receive tours of The Lincoln Performing Arts Centre, Radio City Music Hall, and The Metropolitan Museum of Art. These experiences align with both English Language Arts and drama curriculum outcomes in regards to appreciating diversity, experiencing texts,

appreciating artistry of texts, understanding forms and genres, and demonstrating attentive listening and viewing.

Students will also get to experience 1-2 Broadway performances. Depending on show availability, a list of potential shows will be offered in which I will be able to pick shows that are appropriate for the students. Students will also have the opportunity to go to an improvisational workshop led by a Broadway performer after which the students may ask the instructor questions and hear their stories and experiences of becoming a performer.

Students will get to be guided through multiple historical sites including: St. Patrick's Cathedral, the Empire State Building, Times Square, Central Park, Greenwich Village, SoHo, and the World Trade Centre site. These experiences will allow our students to represent our school as they take in historical sites that exemplify New York's history as one of the first 13 colonies, as well as modern examples of economic globalization by visiting Wall Street and experiencing and giving remembrance to the lives lost during 9/11 at the World Trade Centre site.

I was fortunate enough to go on this tour when I was a grade 10 student through my Instrumental Music class. This tour not only allows students to explore and connect with their artistic expression and passions; but it also allows students to experience historical sites- that they may have heard of or seen in popular culture- in person with relevant information from our tour guide.

The trip is planned and organized by EF Tours and has been able to provide me with quotes and other information that I have attached.

Furthermore, educational travel allows students to develop leadership skills and successfully navigate new experiences with confidence.

The following information highlights some of the ways in which this educational tour can develop competencies in your students and bring lessons from your classroom to life.

COMPETENCY DEVELOPMENT

We at EF know that the primary goal of education is to enable students to develop the knowledge, skills, and characteristics that will lead them to become personally successful, economically productive, and actively engaged citizens-and we want to support you in this endeavor. In addition to proficiency in essential areas such as literacy, mathematics, and humanities, these "21st century" competencies can be developed on any EF tour to help students excel towards higher standards.1

Critical Thinking and Problem Solving	
Critical thinking in the 21st century requires students to solve problems, manage projects, and make effective decisions through a variety of digital tools and resources.	Travelling presents students with new situations that push them to problem solve and strategize (i.e. deciding how to spend their free time, how to fundralse, and how to budget their money on lunches and souvenirs).
Creativity	
Creativity is needed for social entrepreneurialism, considering novel ideas, and leadership for action.	Students will develop their creativity as they discover foreign experiences which revitalizes the mind and increases cognitive flexibility.
Communication	
Communication in a 21st century context requires students to communicate effectively: orally, in writing, with a variety of digital tools, and through listening skills.	Students practice effective oral communication & listening skills while on tour as they interact with peers, their tour director, locals, guides, etc. Students will learn how communication practices are contextual, and practice communicating in a new cultural setting. Students have the opportunity to foster their digital communication skills pre-tour through weShare.
Collaboration	
Collaboration in the 21st century requires students to work in teams, learn from and contribute to the learning of others, use social networking skills, and demonstrate empathy in working with diverse others. ²	Students will learn from and contribute to the learning of others as they ask questions and participate in discussions (i.e. interacting with locals, hone social networking skills, and gain empathy in working with diverse others).
Character Education	
Research suggests that demonstrating non-academic, intrapersonal competencies are key to overcoming challenges and achieving long-term success; i.e. perseverance, honesty, responsibility, a growth mindset, self-confidence, and empathy.	Students will develop self-confidence as they are placed outside of their comfort zone—making decisions while away from their families, and trying new foods and activities. Students will develop empathy for diverse others, and develop valuable life skills.
Citizenship	
Citizenship can be described as global knowledge, sensitivity to and respect for other cultures, and active involvement in addressing issues of human and environmental sustalnability. ³	Students will develop global knowledge, a deeper sense of self, and sensitivity to and respect for others as they are immersed in their host country's culture.

Broadway and the Arts

Curriculum Enrichment

This EF Educational Tour provides numerous opportunities for curriculum enrichment through experiential learning. Below we highlight some ways this tour brings the classroom to life.

History

British explorer Henry Hudson "discovered" New York City in 1609 while searching for a passage to China. Today, the Big Apple is the largest metropolis in the United States. Marvel at the grandeur of **St. Patrick's Cathedral**, with its 26-foot-wide rose window and soaring Gothic spires. These peaks were added in the 1880s, nearly 30 years after the cathedral's construction.

In the evening, view the city from the **Empire State Building**'s observation deck. Once the world's tallest building, the Empire State Building remains one of Manhattan's most elegant symbols. Built in just over a year during the depths of the Depression, this limestone beauty's iconic status was sealed in 1933, when the building starred in King Kong. Since the 1976 bicentennial celebration, the building's top stories have glowed at night with seasonal colours.

The sightseeing tour begins among the bright lights of **Times Square**, home to the Broadway theatre scene, MTV's studios and popular theme restaurants. Make a stop in the 843-acre **Central Park**, a rectangular oasis in the midst of a concrete jungle. Here you will see **Strawberry Fields**, a tribute to John Lennon that includes 161 plant species, representing 161 nations of the world. (If you look overhead, you can also see the Dakota apartment building where John Lennon and Yoko Ono lived.) Travel south toward the mosaic of Manhattan neighbourhoods that make the city so unique. Drive through **Greenwich Village**, New York's eclectic province of bohemians, immigrants and students and pass the cast-iron architecture of impossibly trendy **SoHo** (from "South of Houston Street").

Take a ferry to Liberty Island to marvel at the **Statue of Liberty**. A gift from France in honour of the French-U.S. alliance, the statue's iron skeleton was designed by Alexandre Gustave Eiffel (of Eiffel Tower fame), sculpted by F. A. Bartholdi and modeled on the Colossus of Rhodes. Liberty Enlightening the World, the statue's full title, was unveiled to much fanfare in 1888. Continue on to **Ellis Island**, which welcomed millions of immigrants to the New World around the turn of the last century. Ellis Island is now the site of a museum chronicling the history of European immigration. Finish your tour at the **World Trade Center site** and pay tribute to the victims of September 11, 2001, at Ground Zero.

Business

During free time, take in the always lively **Times Square**, where the billboards are huge, the lights are bright and there's certain to be something exciting happening. Marvel at the various marketing techniques used here. You won't want to miss the 110,000 square-foot Toys "R" Us store, which features a 60-foot indoor Ferris wheel and an adult-sized two-story Barbie dollhouse.

The Arts

Take a tour of Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts, a world-class, 14-acre complex (the first of its kind in the United States) devoted to theatre, music and dance. Follow in the footsteps of conductors like Leonard Bernstein and Arturo Toscanini in Avery Fisher Hall, where both conducted the New York Philharmonic Orchestra. The Center also houses the Metropolitan Opera House and the New York State Theatre, home to George Balanchine's New York City Ballet, the oldest U.S. dance company.

Go behind the scenes at **Radio City Music Hall**, "America's greatest showplace." A spectacular Art Deco theatre built in 1932, Radio City's main attraction is the annual Christmas Spectacular, starring the world-famous Rockettes. This world-class theatre also plays host to countless other concerts, family attractions, network TV specials, film premieres and award shows throughout the year. Recently, Radio City underwent an extraordinary restoration to revitalize its past splendor and to install state-of-the-art technology for its future. Admire the curving balconies, 60-foot-high gold-leaf ceilings, 30-foot chandeliers and decorative carpeting. Learn about the Great Stage, view Art Deco designs, see the mighty Wurlitzer Organ, experience the private apartment of the Music Hall's founder, and visit the active rehearsal halls. Top it all off by meeting one of the Rockettes.

Join New York's many avid theatre enthusiasts at a **Broadway performance** (show depends on availability). Along with London's West End theatre, Broadway theatre is widely considered to represent the highest level of commercial theatre in the English-speaking world. Later, participate in an **improvisation workshop** led by an experienced actor.

With more than 3 million objects in its collection, the **Metropolitan Museum of Art** is home to one of the most extensive art collections in the world. Discover its many galleries that include works from the Paleolithic era to contemporary avant-garde. Among the museum's most popular exhibits are Egyptian artifacts, Oriental sculpture, ancient glasswork, African art, early European musical instruments and American decorative art.

Optional Best of Broadway Schoolroom™: Opt to join teaching artists with a background in theatre education as they show you how to develop life skills, such as communication and imagination, while connecting a popular Broadway show to students on a personal level. Examples of shows that the workshop may highlight include *Wicked*, *Rent* and *The Lion King*.

Centre for Trauma Informed Practices National Conference

CTIP was founded in Alberta and has grown to be the number one worldwide authority on preventing and responding to traumatic events. We use their threat assessment training, as do many school divisions (it is mandatory practice in some provinces though not in Alberta). The national conference is not training but instead provides an opportunity for experts in the field to share research and practice, widening the scope of our knowledge and updating our understanding. Sessions included deep dives into the complications of social media, trauma informed approaches to mental health, and the roles of community leaders. Sessions included:

- Increasing community safety through local leadership
- New Brunswick's Provincial VTRA protocol





- A partnership model for psychosocial intervention for practitioners and Police working with high risk clients
- Honour based crimes and threat assessment
- Implementing research informed continuums of support
- Navigating trauma from a school leadership perspective
- Threat assessment and Adverse childhood experience (ACE) scores
- The power of social media, relationships and meaningful conversation
